32% (136) of our pupils are identified as having additional learning needs (ALN), with a further 20% (84) pupils having emerging ALN needs.

TRANSITION TO COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL



Whole school attendance for this academic year was 89.6%, which falls below the Welsh Government target of 95%. The Welsh Language

Crynallt Primary is an English medium school where lessons are delivered through the medium of English. However, we are very aware of our role as a school in Wales, in promoting and developing the use of Welsh as a living language.

In addition to lessons where we teach Welsh as a second language, the school actively promotes the Welsh language on a daily basis through the use of incidental welsh during lessons, playtimes and assemblies.

Pupils have also had the opportunity to take on an active role as members of Criw Cymraeg, Helpwr Wythnos and through visiting Siop Siarard, where they practice speaking in Welsh and developing their vocabulary.

Community Links, Trips and Visits

School have continued to build strong community links and as always, have continued to be well supported by our local community.

Year 4 worked on a project to make their local park more inclusive and won a prize in the Welsh Heritage Project that they entered on Cynefin. In my role as Councillors, I put these ideas forward to the local council, who have now confirmed that the park will be upgraded. Congratulations for all your hard work Year 4!





Curriculum for Wales

We believe the opportunities provided by the new Curriculum for Wales are exciting and inspiring, providing opportunities for our pupils to develop their basic skills alongside learning skills such as teamwork, resilience, organisation, creativity and self-reflection.

All the work is designed to support pupils as they move towards achieving the 'Four Purposes' of education in Wales. These are:

- 1. To be ambitious, capable learners
- 2. To be creative contributors
- 3. To be healthy, confident individuals
- 4. To be ethically informed citizens of the world

Throughout their time at Crynallt Primary School pupils will benefit from a curriculum that ensures they develop an understanding of all the Statements of What Matter across the 6 Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs). These are:

- 1. Expressive Arts
- 2. Health and Wellbeing
- 3. Humanities
- 4. Language, Literacy and communication
- 5. Mathematics and Numeracy
- 6. Science and technology.

It also includes three cross curricular responsibilities of 'Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Competence'

The resulting curriculum is broad and balanced, enabling pupils to achieve mastery over increasingly complex content, using their developing skills with a higher level of control and independence. In this way we will ensure that all pupils make progress in a wide range of skills, understanding and knowledge.





Assessment is a continuous process and takes place on a daily basis. Progression reference points help learners, teachers, parents and carers to understand if appropriate progress is being made. They set out expectations for learners in each area of their learning, broadly to ages 5, 8, 11, 14 and 16.

Staff and Governors at Crynallt Primary School are committed to ensuring a shared understanding of progression amongst all stakeholders. Parent Forums held every half term ensure regular consultation and review of the curriculum we deliver. This is then fed into our curriculum and assessment design. The school will monitor the impact and effectiveness of its curriculum on a continuous basis throughout the academic year which will feed directly into the self-evaluation and improvement process.
