Building on this, the children explored what plants need to grow, with water playing a central role. They planted seeds, cared for them daily, and watched in amazement as their plants grew and flourished. This hands-on experience helped them understand the vital role water plays in nurturing life and connected beautifully with our wider theme.

In literacy, the children immersed themselves in the Pie Corbett version of Jack and the Beanstalk. They practised retelling the story, created detailed story maps, and even innovated their own versions, demonstrating creativity, confidence, and a growing love for storytelling. Their imaginative ideas brought new twists to the classic tale and showcased their developing narrative skills.

During our church and class worship, we focused on the values of generosity and respect. These themes were explored through the story The Smartest Giant in Town, where the children reflected on how the Giant's kind actions showed true generosity. We also used Sheldon the turtle to talk about how we can show respect for animals, learning to care for and appreciate all living things in our classroom and beyond.

To celebrate all their learning and hard work, we held a joyful Sports Day fundraiser in the summer term. The children proudly
