This term we will be trying to be ***Grateful & Generous, Attentive & Discerning*** learners.

RE topics for this term:

To the ends of the Earth – By the end of this topic, pupils will have learnt about:

- How Christians believe that Jesus rose from the dead.
- The Resurrection, and how it was the work of the Holy Trinity.
- Some Christians die for their faith, this is called martyrdom.
- Some examples of saints, and how they bore witness to Christ in their lives.
- The work of Christian charitable organisations that help people facing injustice and persecution because of their beliefs.
- Their own and others' experiences, feelings and things that matter to them and the ways in which this may lead to different beliefs and different choices about how to live their life.

Dialogue and encounter - By the end of this topic, pupils will have learnt about:

- How Catholics should work to promote 'unity and love' among all people.
- How the Church is called to 'enter dialogue with the world in which it lives. It has something to say, a message to give'.
- How Christians are responsible for promoting the common good.
- Some practical ways in which people can work together towards common goals.

Tuesday: Homework to be returned.

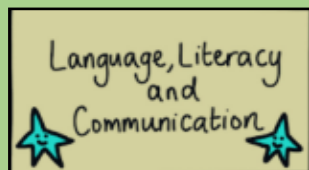
Wednesday: Library books can be changed.

Activities will be sent home which link directly to what the children are learning in school and supports their work in class. Please make every effort to support them and to complete the tasks set.

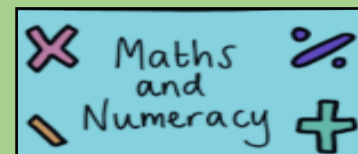

Competition

Why is it important that children learn about this?

This term, our concept is 'competition'. Learning about competition is not just about winning or losing. It helps learners understand themselves, others and the world, and supports them to make fair, ethical decisions. Through competition, learners explore motivation, teamwork, creativity, evidence and fairness in meaningful ways.

Competition often brings strong emotions such as excitement, anxiety, pride and disappointment. Learners need support to recognise these feelings and respond thoughtfully. Competitive contexts help learners understand how rules promote fairness and how their behaviour affects others.

Competition also provides a real-life context for developing scientific thinking. By exploring fair testing, learners learn to control variables, question unreliable claims and challenge unfair advantage.

Together, this learning helps learners develop fairness, emotional awareness and the ability to use evidence to justify decisions. Over time, it supports them to become confident, reflective individuals who can take part responsibly in competitive situations throughout life.
