### School Context

Ysgol Wepre is a county primary school located in Connah's Quay. Flintshire is the local authority. The school is located in a semi urban location and is in the centre of a large

The school currently has 327 pupils on roll including 43 who attend the part-time nursery class. The school has a morning and afternoon nursery and 11 further classes. The standard number is 43. The school has approximately 39 members of the support team covering a variety of roles across the school.

7.24% of pupils are eligible for free school meals. This figure has been consistent for a number of years.

The school identifies around 14% of pupils as having additional learning needs. No pupils speak Welsh as their first language.

The school was last inspected in October 2023. The current Head Teacher has been in post for 15 years.

Rationale for Selection - Due to the changing learning strategies being displayed by pupils, new ways of teaching are required to be explored. Oracy would be a key focus with the intention being to support and enhance pupils' extended writing across the curriculum.

### Priority 4

Rationale for Selection - Self-evaluation processes identified that parent interaction with children's learning and general involvement in school life had diminished over recent years. In addition, the management felt that closer working partnership would be required to develop parents' knowledge of teaching and learning system used within school. The overall impact would be greater collegiality between home and school to support the raising of standards. It would be linked to priority 3.

# September 25

**Priority 1** - To improve the quality of extended creative writing in order to further raise standards.

#### Rationale

During monitoring sessions inconsistencies were noted between classes and year groups, across the school, in the quality of extended writing. In some area's pupils are encouraged to redraft their written work, where in others this is not encouraged. Pupils are unable to explain the process they use when writing and do not appear to have opportunities to revisit and improve their work. Feedback in relation to written work was also inconsistent and impact on pupil's next steps was limited.

Through staff discussions it was agreed that pupils oracy standards have been falling during the last two years, at least. It is felt that this is having an adverse effect on writing. Pupils need the experiences/opportunities to talk first before being able to transfer into written work.
