Our School Context

Blaengwrach Primary School is situated in the Upper Neath Valley and serves the communities of Blaengwrach, Cwmgwrach and Glynneath. We are very fortunate to be sited in a picturesque location and we offer a wide and varied programme of extra-curricular activities.

The school has two buildings; the original block which was built in 1908 and the 'new addition' which was built six years later in 1914. The buildings are separated by play areas. We are extremely lucky to own a school field and a nature area very close to our school. We take every opportunity to make the most of our wonderful grounds.

The original building houses the Head Teacher's Office, the Administration Office, the Community room and several classrooms. The pupil toilet facilities in this building were re-designed and refurbished in 2012 and fully comply with statutory requirements. Toilet facilities ensure the school is fully inclusive. They are cleaned daily with any emergency spills dealt with immediately. Liquid soap and toilet paper is frequently checked and refilled when necessary. Hand driers and paper towels are provided for pupils use.

The Infant building houses the Staff Room, Canteen, hall/library and four classrooms. There is also a separate enclosed play area which has both hard and grassed surfaces.

Blaengwrach Primary School is a single site school located in the village of Cwmgwrach. It is in an attractive setting and parents and children are encouraged to develop ideas for the



enhancement of the external environment of the school. Pupil voice is a particular strength in our school; we are very proud holders of the Healthy Schools National Award, Rights Respecting Gold Award, the second ECO-School Green Flag and the Bronze Siarter Iaith.

Strong Home/School links are vital and we work hard to develop good working relationships with parents and carers. Regular opportunities are provided for parents to connect with school and keep up to date with children's progress. Letters, newsletters, Twitter and texts ensure up to date information is always available. After School Clubs

After school clubs finish at 4:15pm. All children who attend after school clubs must be collected by a responsible adult or given signed consent for them to walk home.

Breakfast Club

We currently run a free breakfast club from 8:10am – 8:40am. Children are offered a healthy breakfast which 'kick-starts' their day with a variety of nutritious choices including toast, cereal and fruit juice. All children attending Breakfast Club must be signed in by a responsible adult. All children must be registered with Breakfast club using the form available from the office prior to attending for the first time.

School Security

The security and safety of the children and staff while at school is of paramount importance. At the beginning of each school day, children enter the school through a number of entrances which are then secured and remain so until the end of the school day.

During the day, a single entry system is electronically operated via the school office. Children who are late or who are being collected early can only enter and leave through the main entrance where they are officially signed in/out.

During playtimes, children are well supervised and playground gates are secured.

There are trained First Aiders on site and all members of staff adhere to the Health and Safety Policy which is available from the office upon request.

Regular Health and Safety checks are carried out by the Head Teacher, Governors and external agencies throughout the year.

School Organisation

Our class structure is governed by our variable year group numbers. Where classes are involved in a mixed age arrangement, the Governors agree that classes are organised according to a number of factors, including; date of birth, balance of gender, dynamics, ability and friendship groups.

The needs of each child are catered for through the hard work and commitment of our dedicated teachers and teaching assistants. Detailed planning, a wide range of formative and summative assessments and a thorough knowledge of the ability of each child all ensure that a broad and balanced curriculum is delivered through a differentiated approach.



Regardless of whether children are placed in a 'straight year group' or a 'mixed year group', each specific cohort of children will display a range of abilities and qualities which our staff are highly trained to cater for. Each year group has access to 'age' and 'stage' appropriate experiences. At our school, there will be times when each child will work in a variety of different learning areas both inside and outside the classroom.

We are supported by peripatetic teachers for Welsh and music and pupils are given the opportunity to learn to play an instrument.

We take the national priorities of raising standards in literacy, numeracy, Welsh and tackling poverty issues very seriously. Regardless of which class a child is placed in, our highly trained staff cater for specific 'groups of learners' to ensure that each child is challenged at their appropriate level. The success of this approach rests with the expertise of our teachers and teaching assistants who are eager to ensure we continue to raise standards of achievement at our school.

Teaching Assistants deliver various programmes including Rapid Reading, Language Link, Speech Link, Wellcomm etc. to various identified groups of learners each week. This ensures children are receiving tailor made opportunities to reach their full potential.

Ensuring every pupil reaches their full potential remains a priority for the school and pupil progress is tracked closely to ensure the curriculum meets the needs of every child and any intervention that is required is identified early on.

Many trips and visits are undertaken during the year, which complements the curriculum. Two are residential in nature and are only available due to the commitment of staff who give up a considerable amount of their private time. Year 4 visit Llangrannog in May in order to develop their Welsh language skills and they have a lot of fun in the process! Year 6 pupils visit Manor Park, Abernant. They take part in a wide range of outdoor adventurous activities. Trips such as these provide great benefits for the children involved. We are indebted to the support from staff involved.

There is excellent attendance at Parent Evenings. This reflects the commitment of our parents and their wish to play their full role in the education of their children.



Admissions

In accordance with the School Admission Code stated by the Welsh Government, parents are able to express a preference for any school. The School has adopted and follows the Local Authority Admission Procedures. Full details of the Neath Port Talbot admission policy can be found in the Information for Parents Handbook which is available from School and Family Support Team 01639 763600. All requests for admission to our school must be made to the Local Authority. We are always happy to help with any queries and we have access to admission forms should you require any assistance. Additionally, parents may contact the School Admission Team on 01639 763580/ 01639 763730 or admissions@npt.gov.uk

Our school currently operates Nursery provision. Attendance is on a part-time basis in either the morning or afternoon sessions. Admission to the Nursery may be achieved the first Monday after the child's third birthday providing that Nursery places exist.

Children are admitted to full-time education in the September following their fourth birthday. Parents are advised to apply for a full time place using the School Admission Form which must be returned to the Local Authority usually in February/March. Reception parents are invited to attend a 'welcome session' with their child during the Summer Term prior to their child beginning full time education in the September.

We welcome all families into our happy, friendly school and look forward to meeting you should you wish to visit us and view our school.

Pupil Voice

Pupil Voice is valued and encouraged at our school. Annually, we have a School Council 'Un Llais' – 'One Voice', which consists of school councillors voted for by the children themselves. School Council are involved in policy and decision making in the school and have created their own child friendly anti-bullying policy. We also have pupil Attendance and Safeguarding Officers. Year 6 pupils are prefects who have responsibility for various roles throughout the school day. School Council also work hard with teachers and local councillors to shape and improve our village and community. Children know their rights and we have been awarded the Gold Award Rights Respecting School Award with several pupils acting as Super Rights Respecting Ambassadors. In addition we have been awarded the second Green ECO Flag (Article 12).



The Welsh Language

Although our pupils are taught predominantly through the medium of English, our pupils are encouraged to use every day Welsh when greeting others. The pupils are also encouraged to use Welsh to communicate outside of formal instruction such as games during playtime and instructions throughout the day. Everyday Welsh is spoken and practised in each class throughout the school and this is reinforced by our very enthusiastic Ciriw Cymraeg at breaktimes and during assemblies. The school actively promotes the development of the Welsh language and is committed to following the Siarter Iaith. We have been awarded the Bronze Siarter Iaith award. The Welsh advisory team visit the school regularly to support and work alongside our teachers and children. We are members of the Urdd and as a result are able to enter the Eisteddfod competitions throughout the year and receive language support from the Urdd leaders. St. David's day is an important part of our heritage and through our curriculum; pupils have the opportunity where appropriate to apply their knowledge and understanding of the cultural, economic, environmental, historical and linguistic characteristics of Wales (Article 30).

Local and Global Citizenship

The school continues to be involved in a range of charitable activities and during the last academic year we raised hundreds of pounds and helped many people in need including: MacMillan Cancer, Children in Need, Genes4Jeans, Sports Relief, and Food Bank Wales. The Governors thank the children and parents for their generosity.

The Curriculum

Extra-Curricular Activities

We have a wide variety of after school clubs available to the children.

Rugby coaching takes place weekly and we have a very popular netball club held once a week by an experienced netball coach, enabling pupils to develop their ball skills and provides an opportunity for pupils to compete in tournaments. We are particularly proud of their recent achievement securing 3rd place in the Swansea Valley/Neath Schools Primary School Netball tournament.

Mrs Charlotte Gibbs, our peripatetic music teacher delivers music tuition each week. The children have the opportunity to play flute, clarinet or saxophone.



During Autumn term 2023 our Year 4 pupils have received 'First Taster' Brass lessons with NPT Music Service and we would like to thank NPT Music Service for providing this fantastic opportunity for our pupils.

There is also a very well attended choir club at lunchtime which enables pupils to perform at various events in school and in the community.

Pupils have the opportunity to take part in Clwb Cymraeg, Gardening Club, Board Games Club, and NPT Pass, physical activities for Year 6 pupils during the Autumn term.

Healthy Schools Initiative

Miss Gully is our Healthy School Co-ordinator and we have been awarded the prestigious Healthy Schools National Award- the only school in Neath Port Talbot to hold this award. Our children are encouraged to eat a balanced diet and drink water throughout the day in order to remain hydrated and to be able to concentrate more readily. Water bottles are provided for each pupil and they bring in fresh fruit for snack every day. In addition, a junior Fruit Shop is run every break time by the Year 6 prefects to encourage healthy eating and develop numeracy skills. Lunchboxes are encouraged to be healthy; fizzy, sugary drinks are avoided by all pupils.

We are very pleased to be actively involved in promoting the Anti-Bullying Alliance message during Anti-Bullying Week and strongly encourage pupils in our school to support each other and consider each other's feelings and wellbeing.

Staff have recently attended Zones of Regulation training to support pupil's social and emotional development and, as a result, we have invested in resources to support our pupils.

Sporting Achievements

Sport in our school continues to thrive as we continue to provide our children with a full and varied programme of sporting activities.

The school has a very successful rugby, football and netball team. Pupils have taken part in tournaments and have been very successful. We continue to strive for an inclusive sports curriculum, whereby all pupils enjoy a full range of sporting activities (Article 31).

The Governors would like to congratulate the many pupils who have taken part in all the sporting and non-sporting activities throughout the year and all the dedicated staff, parents and friends who regularly give their free time to help the pupils and school achieve the many sporting successes.



Other Events

There are many visitors to the school throughout the year, all of whom greatly enrich the pupils learning. The Governors would like to thank all of them for giving their time and sharing their expertise with the children of Blaengwrach.

The school has strong links with our Cluster Secondary and Primary Schools. Links with community are also very strong. Some visitors to our school include: Local Police Liaison Officer, Swansea City Community Football, Healthy Schools Coordinator & School Nurse, The Keep Wales Tidy Officer, The Road Safety Department, Matthew Bunt ECO Schools Coordinator, members of our local churches, Designed to Smile, Mr Ffit and the Community Council.

We work closely with other agencies to ensure the curriculum is rich and varied. We worked hard as a whole school community to obtain the second ECO Green Flag; we continue to promote a number of activities to support this including litter picking, bio diversity areas in the village and pet litter bag stations; We have also cut back on our use of paper in the school by using electronic methods of communication.

We would like to express our sincere thanks to the Community Council for their continued support by allowing school to use the Community Hall, a fantastic community facility, to support our pupils to develop their physical skills using the hall for PE sessions and, also, to host our annual Christmas concerts for families and our local community.

We are very pleased to be part of the Wales Credit Union programme, practice recently commended by Estyn in our recent Estyn Inspection in May 2023. Year 5 and Year 6 pupils run a Credit Union savings club for all full time pupils. This is very popular and many pupils are now long standing savers; promoting financial management is a very important life skill.



Additional Learning Needs

The approach to supporting children who have difficulties with learning is changing. The Welsh Government has passed new legislation, called the **Additional Learning Needs (Wales) Act 2018** and Additional Learning Needs (ALN) Code 2021, replaces all remaining legislation and guidance about special educational needs.

Since September 2021, over a three year period, a new Additional Learning Needs (ALN) system replaces the previous Special Educational Needs (SEN) system. As well as the name change, responsibilities towards children and young people with ALN changed too.

By the end of the academic year 2023/2024 all children with Additional Learning Needs will have an **Individual Development Plan** which will replace current SEN Statements and Individual Educational Plans (IEPs).

Learners with any level of Additional Learning Need who require Additional Learning Provision' (ALP) to be made for them are entitled to an IDP outlining their support needs. This system protects the rights of all children, regardless of the extent of their additional learning needs.

Any existing statements will continue to be legal documents until replaced by an IDP or until the local authority states it intends to end a statement. When a school or LA is 'made aware' that a child or young person may have additional learning needs [ALN], it **MUST** decide whether that child or young person has additional learning needs unless:

- an individual development plan (IDP) is already in place for the child or young person
- a decision *has already been made* and the school is satisfied that the child's needs have not changed since that decision and there is no new information.

The system puts the learner at the heart of everything that happens and our school will take a person-centred approach to planning for, and supporting children and young people. The ALN Act 2018 states that the views, wishes and feelings of children, their parents and young people **must be considered at all stages of the IDP process**. Parents can request that a school consider their child's needs and request that a decision regarding ALN and IDP's are made.

As a caring school we are committed to inclusion and equality, we recognise the uniqueness of each individual. Every effort is made to provide the necessary resources to help all pupils access the curriculum as fully as possible. The school co-operates with other professionals in seeking each child's full entitlement e.g. physiotherapist, speech therapist, visual impairment personnel, hearing impairment personnel etc. (Article 23).



Attendance and Punctuality

Attendance and punctuality is rigorously monitored, with parents being reminded in newsletters about the importance of contacting the school on their child's first day of absence. We operate a First Day Response system and follow the Local Authority attendance policy. If we have not received a message from home, a text message is sent to which parents are expected to respond. Letters are sent out to parents detailing any concerns and consequent procedures.

Attendance posters are displayed around the school reminding parents and carers of the importance of regular attendance.

Personalised colour coded individual pupil attendance percentages are sent to parents termly with a reminder of how important regular attendance and punctuality is.

A breakdown of the consequences of poor attendance is also included. This is helpful to keep parents and carers fully informed. We offer support regarding attendance to any family should they require it.

Pupil attendance last year was 91.2% and our attendance target is 95%. Please remember that holidays should **not** be taken during term time and avoided at all costs.

An Education Welfare Officer visits the Head Teacher on a regular basis and will visit families who require support and encouragement regarding attendance and punctuality (Article 28).

Charging and Remissions

We operate a Charging and Remissions policy which is available on request. Although no charge is made for most school time activities, parents/carers are invited to make voluntary contributions towards the cost of educational visits which form part of the provision of a broad and balanced curriculum. We strive to keep visit costs as affordable as possible and subsidise whenever possible through regular fund raising. In the event of parents/carers being unable to make a voluntary contribution, the child will not be excluded from such activities. However, visits and activities may be cancelled for the entire group/class if there are insufficient funds to cover the costs. Please speak to our Head Teacher, Mrs Williams, if you have any concerns regarding costs. Your concerns will be treated in confidence.



Complaints

Should any parent/carer have any concerns or complaints relating to any matter concerning the school, they are encouraged to arrange an appointment with Mrs Williams, the Head Teacher who will deal sensitively with all matters. A Complaints Policy is available on request and can be viewed on the school website.

Equal Opportunities and Strategic Equality Plan

At Blaengwrach Primary school, we recognise our duty and responsibility to establish equality for all learners, staff, other members of the school community and service users regardless of their race, gender, disability, gender reassignment, sexual orientation, pregnancy & maternity, religion or belief, marriage and civil partnership as defined within the Equality Act 2010. We aim to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity in which all those connected to the school feel proud of their identity and able to participate fully in school life. A copy is available from the office upon request (Article 23).

Safeguarding, Child Protection and Children Looked After (CLA)

We recognise our moral and statutory responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of all pupils. We endeavour to provide a safe and welcoming environment where children are respected and valued. We are alert to the signs of abuse and neglect and follow our procedures to ensure that children receive effective support, protection and justice.

It is the responsibility of the Head Teacher to ensure that all Child Protection procedures are followed correctly and that all staff are trained appropriately to the required standard. A Child Protection policy is available from the office upon request and it can be viewed on the school website.

The Designated Child Protection Officer is Mrs Williams. The Deputy Designated Child Protection Officer is Mrs Thomas. The Designated Child Protection Governor is Mrs Sharon Davies. Should you have any concerns or information you wish to share, please contact any member of staff. All cases will be dealt professionally with efficiency and discretion.

Mrs Williams, Head Teacher, is the member of staff designated as having responsibility for promoting the educational achievement of Children Looked After (CLA). Should you wish to speak to her about any queries regarding CLA provision, she may be contacted at 01639 720342 (Article 19).

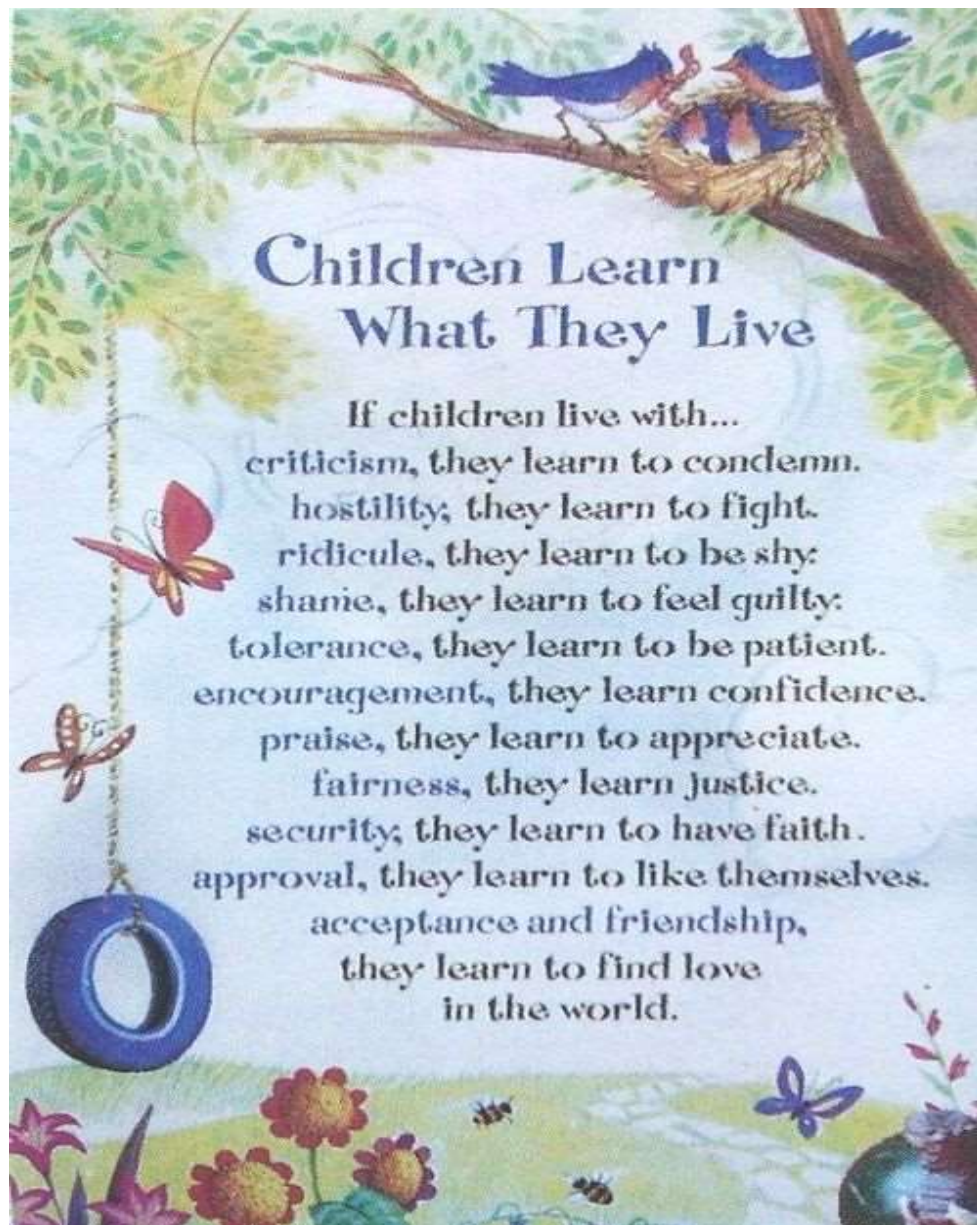
